Kingdom relationships are Christ-centered relationships to God and with believers. Kingdom relationships are a group of believers that live out the teachings for God. Kingdom relationships are viewed through a kingdom perspective. Kingdom relationships are a group of people that prioritize God values. Kingdom relationships differ from purely social or worldly relationships in that they are rooted in spiritual principles and motivated by love and service.

- Pray privately and with others. I want to say when we pray for others it is good, but the person needs to come forward to seek God. This applies for people with mental health and anger problems.
- Give your time, resources, and emotional support to those in need. As a man of God and Bishop of this congregation, I make time for those in need to help the homeless and needy. I will make more time to help the homeless and needy starting next month when I will be living on the eastside of Detroit. I will start making time to volunteer to help the homeless at homeless shelters while living on the eastside of Detroit. Since I got saved and baptized on September 4, 2011; I care for the homeless and poor with my volunteer work I have done in Philadelphia, New York City area, Chicago, Cleveland and Detroit.
- Offer practical help and emotional support, demonstrating true care beyond just words.
- Embrace forgiveness
- Express feelings and needs clearly and respectfully without blaming or accusing.

As christian and disciples to God, we must focus on our own goals and life like the bible says. That's why I say people under 30 years of age need to stop hate on other people with their accomplishments including older generations. We can work towards a more generous and service-oriented society that emphasizes compassion, connection, and a genuine concern for the well-being of all. Faith communities can cultivate an environment where individuals feel truly loved and accepted, empowering them to grow spiritually and impact the world around them.

Jesus demonstrated extraordinary forgiveness, even while being tortured and crucified. Jesus didn't just preach love, he embodied it through his actions. This means act kindly, offer grace, and even serve those who mistreat us, even when it's difficult and we don't feel warm emotions towards them. Jesus specifically instructed his followers to pray for those who persecute them. Jesus' example teaches us that loving our enemies is the only way to break the cycle of negativity and hostility. We can de-escalate situations, promote peace, and demonstrate the transformative power of Christ. Jesus showed compassion even towards those who sought his harm, recognizing their spiritual need and seeking their

redemption. We are called to view our enemies not just as adversaries, but as individuals for whom Christ died, and whom God desires to bring to salvation. When we choose to love our enemies, we are reflecting the character of God, who loved us while we were still his enemies. Loving our enemies, however, fosters inner peace, promotes compassion, empathy, and respect, and allows us to focus on more constructive thoughts and actions.

Jesus was speaking to his disciples about worry and anxiety. He was educating disciples to encourage them to seek God's kingdom and path of righteousness above material pos sessions. Jesus was speaking to his disciples during his ministry in Galilee. Jesus did his ministry about worry and anxiety out of love and compassion. We need to start reading and understanding the bible in context daily. I knew how to read the bible by context when I was in the Spiritual Recovery Program at Star of Hope Mission in Houston in 2023. I never knew how to read the bible by context before the Star of Hope Mission in Houston.

"For he has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins."-Colossians 1:13

Paul was speaking about rescuing the crowd and disciples from the darkness. Paul explained God rescued believers from dominion from the darkness and brought them into the kingdom of the beloved son. We need to acknowledge your deliverance that means reflecting on how God has freed you from sin and its hold on our life. We need to recognize that we are no longer bound to the past. We need to embrace our new identity in Christ by living as someone who belongs to Christ, let your actions, thoughts and words reflect our new identity to God. We need to make sure we align our priorities to the values of God's kingdom, such as love, grace and righteousness. We need to be living our life to honor God in what we do. We need to reject darkness and seek God's kingdom.

"From that time on Jesus began to preach, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."-Matthew 4:17

Jesus was speaking to the kingdom of heaven being near. That is why we need to be seeking God right now including people with mental health and anger issues. People with substance abuse issues need to seek God in their life because those types of people are sinful. We need to repent and confess our sins. Jesus was speaking to the kingdom during his ministry in Galilee.

Jesus replied, "Very truly I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God unless they are born again."-John 3:3

Jesus was speaking to Nicodemus about being born again to honor and seek God's kingdom. Nicodemus asks Jesus how someone can be born again. Jesus spoke to Nicodemus in Judea. It is time for people to not lose their hope in God and gain hope in God by focusing on spiritual renewal and transformation.

"Or do you not know that wrongdoers will not inherit the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived: Neither the sexually immoral nor idolaters nor adulterers nor men who have sex with men nor thieves nor the greedy nor drunkards nor slanderers nor swindlers will inherit the kingdom of God."-1 Corinthians 6:9-10

People with grudges dealing with suffering and dealing with resentment in their life along with emotional well-being and unfair treatment towards others. I believe God is testing those people and their souls to see if they will come to Christ on their own. People like myself who are a man of God and Bishop can only pray for people with grudges, but they have to take initiative to seek God in their life

for themselves. Those people dealing and suffering from grudges have so much hate and negativity in their heart. I think people with mental health problems and suffering from depression in their life need to find a church home. I really believe people under 25 years of age need to read the bible and seek God in their life because those people are dealing and suffering resentment in their life that rather hate and resent older generations that have more accomplishments in their life they achieved through hard work. People like me accomplished what I accomplished through hard work. When I was under age 25, I was still living with my parents and family while I was an undergraduate student at City Colleges of Chicago-Malcolm X College and Kennedy King College. I got my associate degree from Kennedy King College in December 2010 and was admitted to DePaul University as a transfer student to pursue my Bachelor degree in Colleges of Liberal Arts and Sciences in Political Sciences and Religious Studies. People under age 25 like to gossip about people like they know it all like it is a full-time job. People like myself can pray for people under age 25, but it is kind of wasted time because it is like prayers to him will not reach them. It is like their prayers run into a wall and it is up to them to remove that wall by seeking God in their and living obedient to God and his kingdom. When dealing and suffering resentment in your life, I encourage people to perform the following exercise daily (this is good to do when people dealing with mental health, anger, bipolar, depression and oppression):

- Practice deep and slow breaths to calm your nervous system and reduce tension
- Exhale the negative emotions as you breathe out.
- Pay attention to where you feel the physical sensations of resentment in your body.
- Mindful walking
- Understand the root causes of your resentment
- Consider their motivations and circumstances, which can help you understand their actions and potentially lessen your anger.
- Challenge negative thought patterns and replace them with more positive and constructive ones.
- Focus on the positive aspects of your life and express gratitude for the things you appreciate.
- Keeping a gratitude journal can be a helpful way to shift your mindset towards positivity.
- Forgive yourself and others
- Share your feelings with trusted friends, family members, or a therapist.
- Write down your thoughts and feelings about the situation that is causing resentment.
- Exercise can help release tension and improve your mood. That is why you see people in communities walking, running and jogging daily to improve their mood.
- set healthy boundaries to protect your well-being
- Consider seeking help from a therapist or counselor.

"And so we know and rely on the love God has for us. God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in them."-1 John 4:16

John is speaking to the early Christian community to encourage people to love one another. We need to allow love to reshape our relationships and actions for what we do in our life. We need to start practicing love, forgiveness and compassion in our daily life. Ways we can show love daily is by providing small acts of kindness, listening to people, offering help and being supportive. People dealing and suffering from grudges need to start being supportive of people around them and people trying to help them. People need to stop hate on one another and start caring for one another. I show my acts of kindness by helping the homeless and needy at homeless shelters that I volunteered at in Detroit, Chicago, Houston and

Philadelphia. The bible says that everyone is supposed to be worrying about our own life and destiny, not what you see young generations hating on people like me that accomplished things in my life with hard work and God's vision and hard work.
